Carl Paladino will receive the Community Humanitarian of the Year Award as a director of Buffalo Place, Inc., a trustee of the Bishop Timon/St. Jude High School, direc-

tor of the Buffalo Civic Auto Ramps and as a former director of the Horizons Waterfront Commission.

Local successful business owner and World War II veteran Don Crane has created venues such as the Mary E. Crane Foundation. He will receive a Special Award of Merit. Mr. Crane's current focus is on a mission settled in the jungle of South America where the main effort is the education of indigenous children with a questionable future.
